BIOGRAPHIES OF SPEAKERS



Salvatore Rebecchini is Commissioner of the Italian Competition Authority since 2009. Before he has been President of the Board of directors of Fondo Italiano delle Infrastrutture and Cassa Depositi e Prestiti, Head of the Financial Markets Supervision Division of the Bank of Italy, Head of the Delegation of the Bank of Italy in France and financial attaché at the Embassy of Italy in Paris, Assistant to the Executive Director for Italy at the International Monetary Fund. Mr Rebecchini did a PhD in Economics from Columbia University, New York and obtained a BA in Economics at the University “La Sapienza”, Rome.



Ombretta Main is an economist of the Autorità Garante della Concorrenza e del Mercato of Italy. She holds a PhD in Economics (1990) from the University of Sussex (UK). Since 1993 she works at AGCM. She has been working in different fields - liberal professions, postal and financial services, energy - as responsible of the competent unit. Since February 2008 she is head of the Directorate for Community Affairs of the Italian Antitrust Authority.



Lorenzo Coppi has over thirteen years of experience in the application of economics to competition law cases and regulation. Having spent a number of years practicing in London and Washington, DC, Dr. Coppi has worked on a variety of EU, US, and UK mergers and antitrust cases. Dr. Coppi is Visiting Professor at the College of Europe (Bruges), where he teaches Economics of Competition Law. He holds a PhD from the London School of Economics.



Marco Ostuni is a partner at the law firm Cleary Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton LLP, based in the Rome office. His practice focuses on antitrust, telecommunications, media and energy law and he has been involved in some of the landmark cases relating to competition and regulation in the gas, media and telecommunications sectors. He graduated with honours from Naples University Law School (1996), holds an LL.M. from the College of Europe of Bruges (1998), an LL.M. from the Columbia University School of Law (where he was a Fulbright and a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar; 2000) and a Ph.D. in competition law from the University of Perugia (2008). Dr. Ostuni is admitted to the Naples Bar (2001) and the New York Bar (2003). He is distinguished as a leading lawyer in Competition/Antitrust (Italy) and in TMT: Telecommunications by Chambers Europe.



William E. Kovacic has served on the Federal Trade Commission since January 2006, and served as Chairman from March 2008 until March 2009. He has also served, since January 2009, as Vice Chair for Outreach of the International Competition Network. Before he became a Commissioner, Kovacic was the FTC's General Counsel from 2001 through 2004, and also worked for the Commission from 1979 until 1983, initially in the Bureau of Competition's Planning Office and later as an attorney advisor to former Commissioner George W. Douglas. William Kovacic was the E.K. Gubin Professor of Government Contracts Law at George Washington University Law School, where he began teaching in 1999.



Michele Polo is full Professor of Economics. He is Vice rector of Bocconi University. Head of the E. Bocconi Department of Economics till October 2008. He is former Director of the Institute of Economics "Ettore Bocconi" from 2005 to 2007 and is currently Dean for Rectoral Affairs from 2008. He is also the Chief Editor of the *Giornale degli Economisti e Annali di Economia*. He has taught in the Faculty of Economics at the Università di Sassari and he has extensively published on journals of industrial organization.



Anne Perrot is Vice-Chair at Autorité de la Concurrence since march 2009. She was previously vice chair at the Conseil de la concurrence (2004-2009) and full professor at University of Paris I-Panthéon Sorbonne. She is associate professor at Paris School of Economics. She received a Ph.D. in Mathematics and a Ph.D. in Economics. In addition to her work at the Université de Paris I, Anne Perrot was former head of Laboratoire d'Economie Industrielle (CREST). She was a member of the Economic Advisory Group on Competition Policy working with the Chief Economics of the DG Comp L-H. Röller (2003-2006).



Lapo Filistrucchi is a Researcher at the Department of Economics, TILEC & CentER and at the University of Florence. His research fields include Empirical and Theoretical Industrial Organisation, Two-sided Markets, Media, Payment Cards, Internet. He is a leader in economic research on market definition in two-sided markets, also with joint works with Elena Argentesi.



Antonio Buttà is an economist at the Italian Competition Authority (ICA) with several years of experience in government regulation, economic consulting and academic research. Prior to joining the ICA, Dr. Buttà has worked in leading international economic consultancies and for Ofcom, the regulator for the UK communications industries. He has also been lecturer and teacher of economics and of industrial economics in UK and Italian universities. Dr. Buttà holds a PhD in Economics from the London School of Economics, an Italian Doctorate in Public Economics and an MSc in Economics with distinction from University College London.



Peter Lewisch is a partner at CHSH where he deals with public commercial & european law, litigation & arbitration, distribution, antitrust and competition, constitutional & administrative law, commercial disputes. He is a Full Professor at the University of Vienna and Professor of Law, Imadec-University, Vienna and has been Visiting Professor at the George Mason University, Virginia, USA.



Damien Geradin is a partner in the firm's Brussels office, with broad experience in EU competition law. Mr. Geradin is currently a Professor of competition law and economics at Tilburg University and a William Cook Global Law Professor at the University of Michigan Law School. Over the years, he has held visiting Professorships at leading US law schools including Columbia, Harvard and Yale. He is the co-editor of the *Journal of Competition Law and Economics* (Oxford University Press).



Anne Layne-Farrar is VicePresident at Compass Lexecon, where she is specialized in antitrust and intellectual property matters, especially where the two issues are combined. She advises clients on competition, intellectual property, regulation, and policy issues across a broad range of industries, with a particular focus on high-tech. Her client list includes some of the largest information technology, communications, and pharmaceuticals companies in the world. She holds a Phd in Economics from the University of Chicago and has extensively published on economics and law journals.



Knut Blind studied economics, political science and psychology at the University of Freiburg and at Brock University in Canada. He was research assistant at the public finance department at the University of Freiburg, where he was awarded a doctorate. Blind was promoted to professor at the University of Kassel. Since 2006 he is professor at the Technical University of Berlin, Chair for Innovation Economics. He was also awarded the Endowed Chair in Standardisation at the Rotterdam School of Management at the Erasmus University Rotterdam. Blind is heading the new research group Public Innovation at the Fraunhofer Institute of Open Communication Systems since April 2010.



Marta Stryszowska is a senior economist specializing in competition policy at Microeconomix, Paris, France. Before joining Microeconomix, she was a senior consultant at Bates White, Washington DC, United States. She has worked on a range of competition cases before the European Commission and national competition authorities. She has experience in all aspects of competition policy including mergers, agreements and abuse of dominance. She holds a Ph.D. in economics from Tilburg University.



Giandonato Caggiano is a professor of European Union Law and European Judicial System at the Università Roma Tre Law School and director of the post-graduated Master in European Law, Joint Editor of *Studi sull'integrazione europea* (Cacucci, Bari), former director of SIOI (Roma). He is one of the leading Italian experts on EU law and on European integration issues.



Assimakis P. Komninos is a lawyer at the Greek Supreme Court. He has been a practitioner in Athens and Brussels and has been involved in several landmark cases before the European Commission, the Court of First Instance and the European Court of Justice. He graduated with honours from Athens Law School and holds a LL.M. degree from the University of Cambridge with specialisation in European Community law and EC competition law, a second LL.M. degree from New York University with specialisation in international business law and antitrust law, and a Ph.D. from the European University Institute with a doctoral thesis on EC competition law. He is a visiting professor at IREA - Université Paul Cézanne Aix - Marseille III and a visiting lecturer at University College London (UCL).



Alberto Heimler is professor of economics at the Scuola Superiore della pubblica amministrazione (the Italian School of Government), on leave from the Italian Competition Authority. He is the Chairman of the Working Party on Competition and Regulation of the Competition Committee of the Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD). Until 2008 he was in charge of research and international affairs at the Italian Competition Authority and until 2009 he was member of the Steering Group of the International Competition Network (ICN) and co-chair of the Working Group on the Operational Framework. Within the ICN he also co-chaired the Working Group on “Antitrust enforcement in regulated sectors” and the working group on “Telecommunications”. He has published extensively on antitrust and regulatory issues in leading academic journals.

Charlotte Zapfe is Head of Unit “German and European Antitrust Law” in the German Federal Cartel Office. Before, she was a case handler in two decision divisions, one specialized in the energy sector and one specialized in the food sector and the production of consumer goods, and a legal advisor in the unit “German and European Merger Control”. She holds a law degree as well as a PhD in Law from Heidelberg University.



Andrea Renda is a Senior Research Fellow at the Centre for European Policy Studies (CEPS), where he manages the Regulatory Policy Unit. He is also the Manager of the CEPS Digital Forum. Andrea Renda is Adjunct Professor of “Economic Analysis of Law” and “Competition Law and Economics” at LUISS Guido Carli University, in Rome, as well as a Senior Research Fellow at LUISS Law and Economics Lab. He also



lectures on “Advanced Topics in Competition and Regulation” at the Erasmus University of Rotterdam within the European Master in Law and Economics. Andrea was previously a competition economist with National Economic Research Associates (NERA) (2002-2004), and a visiting professor at the New York Law School. Andrea sits in the Scientific Board of Telecommunications Policy (Elsevier) and the European Journal of Risk Regulation (Lexxion). He is a Board member of the International Telecommunications Society and of the EuroCPR.



Ioannis Kokkoris is a Reader at the University of Reading, in the UK, where he teaches competition law and company law. Prior to that he was a Principal Case Officer/Economic Advisor at the Office of Fair Trading, UK where he dealt with leading cases such as NASDAQ/LSE, NYSE/Euronext, Global/GCap and he was a member of the drafting team of the UK Merger Guidelines. He has worked at the DG Competition European Commission, as well as the US Federal Trade Commission. His background combines both law and economics. He holds a BA in Economics (Essex, UK) and an MPhil in Economics (Cambridge, UK), as well as an LLM (Warwick, UK) and a PhD in Competition Law (King's College London, UK) and has conducted research at Harvard Law School. He has authored/co-authored/edited 12 books and has written over 40 articles in leading journals. His most recent books include *Antitrust Law Amidst Financial Crisis* (Cambridge University Press), and currently works on *EU Merger Control* (Oxford University Press). He is also an International Consultant on Competition Policy for the Organisation for Security and Cooperation in Europe, currently working on training in competition law in Armenia and other countries.



Federico Etro is Professor of Economics at the Ca' Foscari University of Venice (Department of Economics), where he teaches Microeconomics and Industrial Organization. Etro is an expert of international economics, industrial organization and antitrust policy with publications on the leading economic journals as *The American Economic Review*, *International Economic Review*, *The Economic Journal*, *Canadian Journal of Economics*, *The RAND Journal of Economics* and many others. His book "Competition, innovation, and Antitrust". A Theory of Market Leaders and its Policy Implications" (2007, Springer, Berlin and New York) develops a theory of market leadership in the presence of endogenous entry of firms and applies it to models of competition in the market and for the market. The recent book "Competition Law and the Enforcement of Article 102" (2010, Oxford University Press), coedited with Ioannis Kokkoris, reviews recent progress in the law & economics of antitrust issues related to abuse of dominance. He writes opeds for Vox, LaVoce and Libero and is the President of Intertic, Vicepresident of Imedipa and a Board Member of the Ca'Foscari-Harvard Summer School.



INTERTIC (International Think-tank on Innovation and Competition) is an academic institution that coordinates and promotes research by international economists working on the subjects of innovation, competition, the protection of IPRs, industrial policy, antitrust analysis and other economic topics of relevance to the understanding of high-tech and New Economy sectors. The 2010 Intertic Conference on Competition in High-tech Markets (Milan, October 11-12, 2010) was about innovation, networks, standards and multi-sided markets, which was the topic of the IV Stackelberg Lecture by Richard Schmalensee (MIT). Executive officers, members and other contributors of Intertic are independent economists with international reputation for their academic activity. Nevertheless their research is linked by a common trust in the importance of free competition to enhance economic efficiency and of the protection of IPRs to promote innovation and growth.
